Re: Parking

This memo is in response to Chief Schwartz's October 5, 2018 email in which he requests an opinion from this office as to whether is it necessary to amend the overnight parking ordinance to enforce a new prohibition which reads "Permit Parking Only Between 7p-7a Between Signs." In my opinion, the answer is no, you do not need to amend the ordinance to create or enforce this prohibition.

I direct your attention to Section 70.008 of the Marshall Code of Ordinances.

Subsection 70.008(B)(2)(a) provides:

- (2) With the consent of the City Council, the Traffic Engineer may prohibit or restrict the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles and may direct the erection of signs giving notice thereof in the following places:
 - (a) On city streets and city parking lots;

Subsection 70.008(D)(2) provides:

- (D) Municipal Lot Parking
 - (2) The Traffic Engineer is authorized, with the consent of the City Council by motion, to establish procedures for the issuance of permits for parking overnight on municipal parking lots.

Based on the above, it is my opinion that you have the authority to prohibit or restrict parking in city parking lots without amending the ordinance, **provided you have obtained the consent of City Council**. Once consent of council is obtained, enforcement under Section 70.010 is appropriate.

A. Neighborhood Improvement Authority Public Hearing:

Finance Director Jon Bartlett provided an informational presentation on the proposed Neighborhood Improvement Authority and Development Area. The public was able to ask questions for clarification during the presentation.

Mayor Reed opened the public hearing for comment on the Neighborhood Improvement Authority.

Tom Waidelich, 625 W. Mansion, asked if the city provided more money to the taxing jurisdictions.

Dennis Gorsline, 600 N. Madison, commented on the amount of the tax capture and at the end of the 20 years inquired what would happen to the remaining money.

Brian Hice, 1405 O'Keefe, inquired what funds are available to fix existing problems. He feels the lighting on O'Keefe is terrible and is need of updating.

David Fry, 908 N. Wooded Lane, inquired of the time commitment of the board that would be created.

Richard Lindsey spoke on behalf of MAEDA and Oaklawn Hospital. He spoke in favor of the plan and is excited to see housing and development take place in Marshall.

Jerry Clifton, Marshall Township, feels the program is a big mistake and the City is being unfair. He feels the problem was left by previous owners and we should not have to pay to clean up the mess. He also commented he hasn't sold a lot in 10 years so more are not needed.

Hearing no further comment, the hearing was closed. No further action was taken.

BACKGROUND: The City and Marshall Township have received a request from Family Bible Church (FBC), LLC 725 North Old US 27 to enter into a Public Act 425 Conditional Land Transfer. FBC is planning an addition which would straddle the City/Township line. A PA 425 agreement brings a property into the City to receive City services but gives a portion of the new taxes collected to the Township.

In 2006, the City and Marshall Township entered into a Master PA 425 Conditional Land Transfer Agreement. In 2015, the Master Agreement was extended to 2026.

PA 425 requires the adoption of a resolution and a public hearing by both governmental bodies. The proposed resolution and contract are attached.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended after hearing public comments that Council approve the P.A. 425 Land Transfer for land owned by Family Bible Church.

The property currently is not taxed.

CITY OF MARSHALL – TOWNSHIP OF MARSHALL CONTRACT FOR CONDITIONAL TRANSFER OF PROPERTY

This Agreement made on the _____ day of October, 2018, between the CITY OF MARSHALL, a Michigan municipal corporation, having offices at 323 West Michigan Avenue, Marshall, Michigan 49068 (the "City") and the TOWNSHIP OF MARSHALL, a Township duly organized under the laws of the State of Michigan, and existing in Calhoun County, Michigan, having offices at 13551 Myron Avery Drive, Marshall, Michigan 49068 (the "Township").

WHEREAS, the City and the Township have adopted a Master 425 Agreement dated February 25, 2006 for the purpose of providing sewer and water services which are available in the City to Township properties upon the request of a Township property owner, and

WHEREAS, the Family Bible Church, the owner of the property described on Schedule 1 attached hereto ("Property") has requested that the City extend sewer and water services to the Property, and

WHEREAS, the provision of municipal services by the City to the Property would further the economic well-being of both the City and the Township and increase the probability of additional development of the Property, and

WHEREAS, the City has available sewer and water capacity to service the Property, and

WHEREAS, the parties have each conducted a public hearing to receive input on the proposed transfer of property.

NOW, THEREFORE, by authority of Act 425 of the Public Acts of 1984 and pursuant to the Master 425 Agreement entered into between the City and the Township and in consideration of the mutual promises herein set forth, BE IT AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Township consents to the transfer to the City of the Property.
- 2. The City agrees to accept the transfer of the Property for all purposes allowed under Public Act 425 of 1984, as amended, to make available municipal services to the Property provided that the Property owner and other users of the utilities extended from the City to the Property shall pay for the cost of the extension.
- 3. The transfer of the Property contemplated by this agreement shall occur at midnight on October _____, 2018.
- 4. Following transfer, and during the term of this Agreement, the City shall have full jurisdiction over the Property subject to the following limitations:

Land usages shall be subject to the Joint Municipal Planning Commission pursuant to the provisions of the Master 425 Agreement.

5. The City and Township agree that the City shall have the authority to assess and collect ad valorem taxes, real and personal, on the Property and any improvements thereon during 2019 and for the remainder of the term of this Agreement. The Township shall have the authority to assess and collect ad valorem taxes, real and personal, on the Property and any improvements thereon through calendar year 2018.

The City and Township further agree that commencing in the year 2019 and continuing through the fiftieth (50th) full calendar year thereafter, all such taxes which the City collects for its own general operating fund purposes only, and which are attributable to the Property for the term of this Agreement shall be shared between the City and the Township as follows:

- A. The Township shall receive the equivalent of 3 mills levied on the taxable value of the Property for the taxable year as established by the City subject to any subsequent adjustments resulting from tax appeals. The City shall transmit the Township's share of such revenues annually on or before 30 days after receipt.
- B. Thereafter, all tax revenues from the Property shall be collected and retained by the City.
- 6. Except as provided in paragraph 7, upon termination, expiration or non-renewal of this Agreement, jurisdiction of the Property shall pass to the City and the Township shall have no further rights or interests in the Property.
- 7. In the event that the City shall not share tax revenues from the Property as provided in paragraph 5 or shall breach any other provision of this Agreement, the Township shall be entitled to terminate this Agreement, whereupon jurisdiction of the Property shall revert to the Township or the Township may pursue whatever other legal remedies are available to the Township.
- 8. Any liability the City or the Township incurs to a third party as a result of the performance of duties or the exercise or rights imposed or granted hereunder shall be jointly shared and defended in the same proportion as the taxes are shared as described in paragraph 5.
- 9. The burden of all tax abatements shall be shared by the City and the Township in the same percentage as the millage is shared. In the event the City reduces its millage, the Township's share of millage shall be proportionately reduced provided no additional taxes are levied by the City to replace the reduction in millage.
- 10. Sewer and water rates charged to the Property owner shall not be greater than the rates charged in the City for similar users. Property owners shall contribute to repairs and capital improvements to the sewage treatment facilities, water purification plant, well facilities, and distribution systems in the same manner as similar users within the City of Marshall.

- 11. In the event there is a conflict between this Agreement and the Master 425 Development Agreement, the terms of the Master 425 Development Agreement shall control unless there is a specific reference in the conflicting provision that it is intended to prevail despite the Master 425 Development Agreement.
- 12. Within fifteen (15) days of execution of this contract, the City Clerk shall file a duplicate original of this contract with the Calhoun County Clerk, the Michigan Secretary of State and the Calhoun County Register of Deeds.

SUBJECT: Retiree Healthcare (OPEB) Corrective Action Plan

Presentation

BACKGROUND: Public Act 202 of 2017, Protecting Local Government Retirement and Benefits Act, went into effect on December 20, 2017. The local reporting required under this Act relates to retirement pension benefits and retirement health benefits. On January 11, 2018, the City of Marshall filed Form 5572 — Pension Report and Health Care (OPEB) Report with the Michigan Department of Treasury. On March 1, 2018, the City received the Department of Treasury's letter titled "Preliminary Review of Underfunded Status" for our Retiree Healthcare Plan due to the fact that our Retiree Healthcare Plan liabilities are funded at 3.7%.

In accordance with PA 202, a local governmental unit may apply for a waiver of "underfunded status" by filing an Application for Waiver and Plan with Treasury, outlining the steps the local unit has enacted to reach a 40% "funding level" within 30 years as recommended by the State. The waiver was filed with the Michigan Department of Treasury on April 11, 2018. On May 17, 2018, the Finance Department received correspondence the City's waiver was denied. The City Council must adopt a "Corrective Action Plan" to be filed with the Michigan Department of Treasury no later than November 13, 2018.

The Finance Director asked Watkins Ross, the City's Retiree Healthcare Actuary, how different funding options would affect our funding status. The different funding options were to contribute \$200,000, \$400,000, or \$600,000 per year in addition to the "pay as you go" healthcare costs. These funds will be transferred to the City's MERS RHVF account at the beginning of each fiscal year starting July 1, 2019. The different funding options and different rates of return are shown on the attached City of Marshall: Contribution Study.

RECOMMENDATION: After hearing staff's presentation on the Retiree Healthcare Corrective Action Plan, it is recommended City Council approve the Additional Retiree Healthcare Contribution Resolution, which will mandate that the City contribute and budget for an additional \$200,000 per year into the City's MERS RHVF account. Based on a 6% rate of return this will produce a funding level of 40% in the year 2044. It is also recommended City Council approve the Retiree Healthcare (OPEB) Corrective Action Plan as presented and authorize staff to file the Corrective Action Plan with the Michigan Department of Treasury on or before November 13, 2018

<u>INTRODUCTION</u>

In December 2017, Public Act 202 of 2017 was signed into law. This new law requires all local governments to annually report its pension's and retiree healthcare unfunded liabilities to the State of Michigan, Department of Treasury, and creates certain criteria to determine if a the local government is in "underfunded status". PA 202 creates minimum funding requirements for both pension plans and retiree healthcare plans. Retiree healthcare is also referred to as "Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB). In addition, PA 202, provides for standard actuarial assumptions for determining funding status which will be reviewed and published by the Michigan Department of Treasury.


If a local unit of government is determined to be "underfunded" based on PA 202 criteria, the local unit is subject to review by a governor-appointed "municipal stability board". This board will review annual reports and corrective action plans of local units required to submit them when the local unit has not been granted a waiver under the Act.

The City of Marshall, like many other cities and villages across the State, applied for and was denied a waiver for our retiree healthcare (OPEB) due to its "underfunded status". According to our 2017 Audited Financial Statements, the City of Marshall's OPEB is funded at 3.7% which is well under the 40% threshold set by Treasury.



CITY OF MARSHALL – FINANCIAL CONDITIONS




Since 2008, Marshall's state revenue sharing has seen a steady decline. In 2018, state revenue sharing is still below the amount received in 2008.


As one can see by the graph above, from 2010-2017 actual out-of-pocket (pay as you go) costs for retiree healthcare has increased \$234,126.



As one can see by the graph above, Defined Benefit Pension costs have increased \$807,658 from 2009 to 2018.

CITY OF MARSHALL – FINANCIAL CONDITIONS-Cont.

The City of Marshall develops it budget using a 10 year revenue and expense model for all governmental and business type funds. Each specific revenue and expenditure line-item is given an individual inflation factor to which the 10 year budget model is generated. Fund Balance/Net Position is then analyzed for each year and appropriate decisions are made. Below is the projected difference between revenues and expenditures for the City of Marshall's General Fund.




The FY 2018 budgeted gap between revenues and expenditures was \$138,169 (which included a pay freeze for all non-union employees) while the projected FY 2028 gap is \$2,436,608



Active participants represent approximately 22% or \$5,595,870 of the total OPEB liability of \$25,442,509. This liability will grow over time based on the inflation factors surrounding healthcare since retiree healthcare is closed to anyone hired after January 1, 1997. If one was to only look at active participants based on the Plan assets, the level of funding would be 16.80%.



Inactive participants represent approximately 78% or \$19,846,639 of the total OPEB liability of \$25,442,509. This liability will grow over time based on the inflation factors surrounding healthcare and active participants retiring but will also decrease based on the age of the group. If the Michigan Department of Treasury is going to give the City of Marshall 30 years to get to the 40% funding level, approximately 85 of the 107 current inactive participants will be between the ages of 90 and 120 years old.

Based on the same scenario above, if the Michigan Department of Treasury is going to give the City of Marshall 30 years to get to the 40% funding level, approximately 91 of the 125 current active and inactive participants will be between the ages of 90 and 120 years old.

CORRECTIVE ACTION PLAN

On October 15, 2018, staff will present to Marshall City Council this Corrective Action Plan for the City's Retiree Healthcare Plan (OPEB) for approval prior to filing with the Department of Treasury.

Presently the City of Marshall is 3.7% funded for it retiree healthcare liability (OPEB) which was \$25,442,509 as of June 30, 2018. The policy of the City, like many other communities, is to pay for retiree healthcare on a "pay as you go" basis. The City closed retiree healthcare to all employee hired after January 1, 1997.

In April 2018, the City's Finance Director asked Watkins Ross, the City's Retiree Healthcare Actuary, how different funding options would affect our funding status. The different funding options were to contribute \$200,000, \$400,000, or \$600,000 per year in addition to the "pay as you go" healthcare costs. These funds will be transferred to the City's MERS RHVF account at the beginning of each fiscal year starting July 1, 2019. The different funding options and different rates of return are shown on the attached City of Marshall: Contribution Study.

COUNCIL ACTION:

After hearing staff's presentation on the Retiree Healthcare Corrective Action Plan, it is recommended City Council approve the Additional Retiree Healthcare Contribution Resolution, which will mandate that the City contribute and budget for an additional \$200,000 per year into the City's MERS RHVF account. Based on a 6% rate of return this will produce a funding level of 40% in the year 2044. It is also recommended City Council approve the Retiree Healthcare (OPEB) Corrective Action Plan as presented and authorize staff to file the Corrective Action Plan with the Michigan Department of Treasury on or before November 13, 2018

WHEREAS, the City of Marshall is required to file a corrective action plan with the Michigan Department of Treasury pursuant to PA 202 of 2017 due to the fact that the City's retiree healthcare plan (OPEB) liability is funded at 3.7% and that the criteria set by Treasury is 40%; and

WHEREAS, part of the "Corrective Action Plan" is for the City of Marshall to contribute an additional \$200,000 annually in addition to the normal "pay as you go" retiree healthcare costs, starting July 1, 2019: and

WHEREAS, the Directors and the City Manager feel that this additional \$200,000 can and will be found within current budget levels; and

WHEREAS, this resolution shall remain in effect for the same period of time that the 2018 Retiree Healthcare Corrective Action Plan if approved by the Michigan Department of Treasury.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, in order to reduce the unfunded retiree healthcare liability, in consideration of the financial restrictions of the City of Marshal, the need to provide services to the public, and economic conditions out of the City's control; the City of Marshall shall contribute \$200,000 annually to the City's MERS RHFV account.
